Hi, I'm father Dick Senghas. Governor LePage and Council, I am the officer of ecumenical and interreligious affairs in the Catholic diocese of Portland, which includes the entire state of Maine. I speak to you today, not only on behalf of our diocese, but also of the Maine Council of Churches, for which I am on the board. I also speak on behalf of many Christian religious faiths of our state, as well as the Interfaith Power and Light and others who work for environmental concerns in our state.
