- > Established access to dozens of water bodies
- Secured mountain summits, salt marshes, rivers, lakes, ponds, and coastal shorelines
- Provided an economic boost by conserving working farms and forestlands
- Addressed the diverse interests of Maine citizens those who fish, hike, farm, raft, bike, boat, hunt, snowmobile, camp in short, all who value the <u>rich natural heritage that is Maine</u>

- > Operates exclusively on a <u>willing seller/willing buyer</u> basis
- > Works collaboratively with state agencies, local communities and Maine citizens
- Adheres to a strict appraisal review process and stringent guidelines
- Guarantees <u>public access</u> and protects valuable natural resources for future generations to enjoy
- > Stretches state resources by attracting millions of dollars in federal and private matching funds
- ➤ Is administered by a Board comprised of six private citizens and the five State Natural Resource Agency Commissioners all confirmed by the Maine Legislature

- > Communities by helping to address sprawl and by making Maine a more desirable place to live
- **Economy by protecting the backbone of our natural resource based industries**
- > Environment by countering the impacts of fragmentation and loss of wildlife habitat
- > People by providing greater public access to Maine's outdoors and by protecting our heritage
