The Maine Environmental Education Association (MEEA) Conference announced today that Lisa Pohlmann will be the keynote speaker at the organization's upcoming annual conference scheduled for Friday, April 1 at the Chewonki Foundation in Wiscasset. Pohlmann is the newly appointed executive director at the Natural Resources Council of Maine, a leading environmental advocacy organization in the state. This year's MEEA conference will bring together Maine leaders and practitioners in education, health care, agriculture, energy, youth programs, and environmental advocacy to address the needs of environmental educators in a climate of enormous change.

Topics and workshops of the day will include:

- Children's Heath how to incorporate movement and outdoor time to address the epidemic of obesity;
- Twenty-First Century Skills ~ using environmental education to build skills including problem-solving, creativity, inquiry and communication needed to be a productive and involved citizen;
- Energy Needs ~ Balancing changing societal needs in sustainability, climate change,
 energy resources and transportation; and
- Sustainable Food ~ workshops on local food movements, farms-to-schools, and connecting our citizens to food sources and agriculture.

"With Ms. Pohlmann's address and an impressive slate of workshops, this year's conference is shaping up to be one of our best in our 25 + years of providing the conference," said MEEA president Pat Maloney. She added that the MEEA board has exciting plans to present both its annual lifetime achievement award as well as two outstanding educator awards.
