Re: Energy Efficiency Now: Saving Money, Saving Jobs

Dear Chairmen Thibodeau and Fitts, and members of the Committee,

We are part of Maine's significant and growing industry of energy efficiency companies. Maine has taken some important steps to make energy efficiency a priority for homes, businesses, and industry, and we are the workforce that turns energy efficiency investments into reality. It is essential that Maine continues its momentum of support for energy efficiency, including through the important work of Efficiency Maine.

Energy efficiency is Maine's lowest-cost energy resource, and there remains a large untapped potential of cost-effective opportunities in our buildings and industry.

Energy efficiency investments are especially important because they keep money flowing in the Maine economy. Unlike Maine's enormous spending on oil and gas that goes out of state, energy efficiency requires local labor and local companies that can't be exported or outsourced. And the savings on energy—which can easily be 25-50% of customers' bills—get re-circulated into the local economy as spending on others things. The total economic impact is very large.

In partnership with Efficiency Maine programs, Maine contractors, vendors, engineers, and other companies have helped consumers in the state <u>reduce energy costs by half a billion dollars</u> since 2004.

Energy efficiency should be Maine's top energy priority because it is very cost-effective, reduces use of fossil fuels, and strengthens our economy—but it won't be maximized without continued public efforts that help overcome barriers to investment. Efficiency Maine with its mix of expertise, incentives, public education, and more, helps overcome many of these barriers and maximize cost-effective investments.

It is difficult for our energy efficiency companies to thrive and maximize our payrolls in an environment where interest and investments in energy efficiency only follow the rollercoaster of energy prices. Reducing energy costs can be a reality if we keep our attention on energy efficiency over time. Clear, sustained policies by the State provide the certainty that help us invest in additional jobs, equipment, and training.

Please make energy efficiency a priority during the coming legislative session, and work actively and in a bipartisan fashion to ensure that Efficiency Maine has the resources to continue the momentum. Help companies like ours continue to grow and thrive, while reducing electricity and heating oil costs for Maine consumers.

Dear Chairmen Thibodeau and Fitts and members of the Committee,

Over the last 22 years I, through my real estate management and development firm East Brown Cow Management, Inc., have spent well over \$1 million implementing energy efficiency improvements. These improvements accrue to my benefit as well as my tenants, but even more importantly, the capital required to produce them are spent to hire local contractors. This capital is financed by the long term savings in energy which alternatively would stream to energy suppliers far beyond the borders of Maine. Many of these improvements would not be viable without both the expertise and guidance, as well as the supplemental capital, provided by Efficiency Maine.

Efficiency Maine has guided us in the complete replacement of outdated inefficient lighting in a 400 space structured parking garage with new, highly efficient LED lighting – yielding significant operating savings and superior visibility.

A new chiller to provide cooling using half the historical energy consumption in a 10 story Portland office tower is in the final stage of installation.

We have replaced thousands of fluorescent fixtures with state-of-the-art T5 lights which in some cases reduce power consumption by over 65%.

In a state where energy costs are high and business growth is weak investing in energy efficiency is a critical component of making Maine business viable. Much of this improved infrastructure would never make it off the drawing boards without Efficiency Maine. The most effective route to increasing Maine's energy efficiency is leveraging and supplementing the capital of Maine citizens and businesses.

I hope, in the pursuit of creating a more competitive landscape in Maine, you find these compelling reasons to support increasing the funding to Efficiency Maine.
