LD 1094 will give voters the opportunity to approve a \$20 million bond on the November 2021 ballot, focused on reducing energy bills for senior citizens, low-income residents, Maine towns and cities, and schools through cost-effective weatherization and energy-efficiency investments.

Lower Energy Bills for Those Who Need the Help the Most

- Maine's older buildings that have not been weatherized cost families, towns, and schools in unnecessarily high electricity and heating bills.
- Low-income residents, and especially low-income rural residents, often pay a much higher percentage of their incomes to meet home energy needs.
- Expanding the state's successful energy efficiency and weatherization programs will deliver immediate energy cost savings to homeowners, businesses, and municipalities.

Energy Efficiency Jobs and More Comfortable Homes and Schools

- A \$20 million weatherization bond will create an estimated \$45 million in lifetime energy savings for Maine people and support nearly 200 jobs.
- The \$10 million in funding for seniors and low-income residents would save the average homeowner approximately \$300 a year.
- The \$10 million funding for Maine schools and municipalities will create \$33.5 million in lifetime energy savings, saving taxpayer money by easing municipal budgets.
- More than 1,500 homes would be weatherized by Efficiency Maine, saving 200,000 gallons of heating fuel a year and reducing 105 million pounds of carbon pollution, the equivalent of taking 10,000 cars off the road.
