PROTECTING WHAT WE LOVE

On September 25, 2024, Natural Resources Council of Maine (NRCM) staff and board gathered with members at Wolfe's Neck Center for Agriculture and the Environment in Freeport to present awards to extraordinary people who have made a difference for Maine's environment. It was a joyous occasion, with individuals honored for work focused on a wide range of issues, each one essential to protecting the nature of Maine. This event, Protecting What We Love, had previously been named for the honor itself, our "Conservation Leadership Awards." There was no better time—and no better reason—to rename the event this year.

Protecting what we love would seem to be a natural instinct. Perhaps it is, but that does not mean doing so is easy. For NRCM members, protecting what we love sometimes requires courage. It means talking to our elected officials or writing letters to the editor of our local paper, or speaking at a public hearing. These are not actions most of us take on a frequent basis. For many of you, doing so with NRCM this past year was the first time you have ever taken such a step.

These actions individually can make a world of difference in a place like Maine, where our elected officials are often our neighbors. We are fortunate that our lawmakers are not out of reach here the way they are in most states. NRCM staff have heard from lawmakers that sometimes, a lone, impassioned voice can make the difference in how they vote on an issue. Imagine the power of that voice multiplied.

We saw that power in action this year, when hundreds of you spoke out at public meetings, rallies, and hearings to express your opposition to a mine that would threaten the clean waters and iconic landscapes of the Katahdin region, including Baxter State Park and Katahdin Woods & Waters National Monument. Almost fifteen hundred of you provided comments to decision-makers on this important matter. Thousands more signed our petition in support of removing four dams from the Kennebec that are preventing the river above the dams from recovering the way the waters downriver have, creating new opportunities for the communities along its banks. More than 500 Maine businesses, towns, and organizations joined us in helping put the first-ever Maine Trails Bond on the 2024 November ballot. Close to 11,000 of you contacted your elected officials about at least one piece of NRCM priority legislation.

Your voices matter. NRCM could not do what we do—pass transformative legislation that ensures a safe and healthy environment for generations to come—without you. Our work together is moving Maine toward a clean energy future that works for all. It is helping communities become more resilient to climate change—more essential than ever, in light of this year's violent winter storms. We are ensuring less waste and more sustainability, and strengthening protections for endangered wildlife. Your efforts were

every bit as vital as we faced down efforts by polluters to weaken existing safeguards.

To succeed requires voices speaking up from all walks of life, in all regions of the state. The knowledge of NRCM staff is deep and broad, but Maine people, speaking together, is the difference maker. That is why we are committed to further expanding our outreach, the way we did recently when we placed a staff member in Franklin County.

As we celebrate many big accomplishments this year, we are preparing for the upcoming legislative session. Encouraging more homegrown clean energy sources like offshore wind and solar, advancing healthier transportation options, and building a more modern, reliable, and affordable electric grid remain priorities for us. We made progress toward achieving State recognition of sovereignty for the Wabanaki Nations with the signing of LD 2007—the first time the 1980 Maine Indian Claims Settlement Act has been significantly amended. We will continue our work toward full recognition of sovereignty.

NRCM is so thankful that you are with us, and that you, like us, love and respect this beautiful place so much. Maine's lands, waters, and wildlife are healthy today because, over the years, so many people cared. Our collective voices and bold actions today are ensuring Maine remains a special place for generations to come.




